

Newly Adopted Elementary Math Program Prepares Students for Assessment Exams

Earlier this year, the Tonawanda City School District adopted the Go Math! textbook series to help address the new Common Core Learning Standards (CCLS).

For each grade level, the chapters are organized by critical area. Each chapter begins with a "Show What You Know" which is a quick assessment that allows teachers to gear instruction based on students' prior knowledge of prerequisite skills. Throughout the lessons, students



are taught concepts and skills by transitioning from the concrete (manipulatives, drawings) to the abstract (traditional pencil-and-paper).

Of the many resources associated with the text, several involve the use of technology. Teachers have online access to digital copies of all materials, interactive iTools, real world videos, and animated math models which provide teachers with instant feedback and help students become more comfortable with taking computer-based tests. Teacher Publishes NYS ELA Test Guide

Melissa Miller, an eighth-grade English teacher at TM/HS has recently published her latest review book set to be released in February. It's titled *The Barron's New York State Grade 8 English Language Arts Test: All You Need to Know for the Grade 8 Test.* Co-authored with Cindy Lassonde, this is the follow-up to the seventh-grade review book that the duo published through Barron's two years ago.

This brand-new book is fully aligned with the Common Core State Standards and opens with an explanation of New York State's standards for English Language Arts and Literacy. Teachers are directed on the best way to use this book, students are advised on preparing for the eighth-grade ELA test, and it presents a diagnostic test with answers to analyze students' strengths and weaknesses.

Chapters focus on test overview and effective test-taking strategies, practice exercises in reading, listening and reading, and reading and writing. Also included are two full-length practice tests with answer keys and a strategies checklist. The manual also features a helpful glossary of literary genres and terms.

A Message from the Superintendent:

Dear Tonawanda City School District Residents,

I would like to take this opportunity to thank you for allowing me to serve as superintendent of our great city school district. As most of you are aware, I have been employed in the district for 14 years as a secondary principal. I replaced the legendary Mr. Richard Catlin.



A smooth transition is essential to ensure the superintendent is a successful district leader. Building trust, accumulating situational awareness, and ongoing communication are fundamental to creating a community that supports the school district. I will continue to generate a strong community presence as well as assess the district's strengths and identify critical issues. I will review and establish priorities and focus on achieving short-term goals and develop long-term goals.

My vision as superintendent will be to build on the HOPES of the Superintendent Search Advisory Committees. These committees represented all stakeholders and included a student representative. When interviewed, the committees asked me what I would do for the district. I told them that as the new superintendent, I would be a positive leader who continually promotes our district's assets and builds a positive morale with all stakeholders. Shared Decision Making is essential, especially when major decisions are made. Student achievement is the highest priority.

Schools are here to educate students; therefore, all decisions must be made by closely examining student needs. There are many monetary increases that are beyond the district's control such as retirement system, insurance and salaries. While understanding that reductions will need to be made, we will need to look at other areas to cut spending prior to reducing teachers and program. Of course, class sizes, staffing and program will be analyzed to determine what is best instructionally for our students.

Shared services need to be pursued and used to the greatest feasible extent. Operational consolidation should be examined in the areas of central office, support services, special education programs and joint purchasing. I will work with the Tonawanda City Council to look for ways to share services with them.

The Capital Project has recently been approved by the State Education Department. Bids have been sent out and construction of the music wing and the new Clint Small Stadium will begin in March. The stadium should be completed by the start of the 2013-14 school year.

I am hopeful that the Board of Education and I will develop a high level of trust and maintain a respectful working relationship. The search advisory committee, as well as the community, expect us to be professional and courteous to one another.

I look forward to serving as the Tonawanda City School District Superintendent. I will do my best to keep communication ongoing within the community. As a building principal, I always had an open door policy; I will continue this practice. Feel free to contact me with any concerns, questions or comments. We need to work together to create a climate where all students feel safe, student achievement increases, and we continue to offer a quality education within the confines of our budget.

Focus on Instruction: The district shall provide a curriculum, instruction and programs for the effective education of all students.

Century of Excellence

Objectives:

- 1. Explore District staffing levels and establish program goals for minimum and maximum class size levels.
- 2. Provide an Enrichment Curriculum for Grades 3-5 for 2012-2013 with exploration for program growth. Compare prior year results with current.
- 3. Promote a positive school environment through the installation and implementation of programs such as Leader in Me, Rachel's Challenge and the Olweus Program and develop a mechanism to record events in order to measure progress.
- 4. Ensure that District curriculum aligns with Common Core Standards across all academic disciplines with the intent to increase Mastery levels in all assessments by 10% over prior year results.
- 5. Positively affect District attendance and drop out rates by strengthening the District's RTI program, increasing attendance to greater than 95% at the elementary level, 92% at the secondary level and reducing dropouts by 50% from the prior year.

- 7. Prepare a Professional Development Plan for those staff members identified as needing improvement.

- 1. Prepare a plan of action to develop a Marching Band at the Tonawanda Middle/High School.

Interested candidates can pick up applications from the Board Office located at 100 Hinds Street between the hours of 8 a.m. and 4 p.m. Petitions must be signed by at least 100 eligible/ qualified voters. Completed petitions must be filed with the Board Clerk not later than May 1, 2013 at 5 p.m.

Qualifications for School Board Membership:

You must be a citizen of the United States, at least 18 years of age, a resident of the district for one school year prior to the election (before May 15, 2013) and able to read and write.

Leadership Begins at Riverview with P.I.G.S and W.I.G.S

Riverview School is continuing to achieve its school-wide goals by focusing on its PIGS (pretty important goals) and WIGS (wildly important goals) based on the philosophy of Dr. Franklin Covey's "Leader in Me". So far the school has implemented a leadership board in the cafeteria, created and posted classroom mission statements and begun their leadership role application process. They also participated in the district parent Leader in Me night. Members of the Lighthouse Team have been invited to present in May at the national Leader in Me symposium being held in WNY. Stay tuned as the school makes its way to their next pretty important goal with student data notebooks.

Stadium and Music Work Begins

On Thursday, Jan. 10, the State Education Department notified Tonawanda Schools that they had completed their technical review of the project and that a building permit has been issued for construction. With approval in hand, Wendel, the architect, and Pike, the construction manager, put the project out to bid on Friday, Jan. 11. Bids will be received in February, and we anticipate awarding a contract for construction at our Feb. 26 board meeting.

The public should see the first signs of activity on site in mid-March. The contractor has an early August deadline to complete the stadium, so work will initially be focused on that area. A temporary parking lot will be constructed, which will allow the demolition of a portion of the existing lot, allowing construction of the new field and track to begin. By mid-April, construction of the concession and restroom facilities will be underway, as will foundations for the new music addition. With the end of school on June 23, construction activity will move into high gear, with installation of the bleachers, steel for the addition, and renovation of interior spaces.

By September, the sports teams will have been using the new field for several weeks, the new bus loop will be finished and students will be arriving through the new entrance. For the most part, the only work left to be completed will be the interior of the new addition. The project should be complete by sometime this fall.

Mullen is Moving Up the Clip Chart

"Clip up." "Clip down." "Choose a jewel." "Move to Leadership Lane." You may not know what these phrases mean, but ask any of the students at Mullen Elementary and they can tell you. A new behavior system is in place this year to help the students grow into leaders. Using the clip chart system, students are rewarded for behaving like leaders. Those who are not acting in a leadership manner are given consequences for making incorrect choices.

Each student has a clothespin with their name on it. Everyone begins the day with their clothespin in the green Ready to Learn section. As the day progresses, students are instructed to clip up the chart when they display good qualities. They move from green section, to yellow Good Leader, to orange Great Leader to red Outstanding Leader. If at the end of the day that student is still on red, they choose a jewel to glue onto their clothespin. The next day all the students begin the day on green again.

If a student makes an unfortunate behavior choice, they will be asked to clip down to the blue Think About It section. If more incorrect choices are made, that student will have to clip down again to purple Teacher's Choice and then pink Parent Contact. If that student is able to make better choices during the day, they can clip back up and still have a chance to earn a jewel for the day.

Once a student earns four jewels on their clip, they take it to the main office where it is clipped on the Leadership Lane display. Principal Jessica Lyons chooses a few each day to wear on her lanyard and stops by the classroom to personally congratulate the students for their great work. Afterward students are able to take their clip home and share their success with their families. Students are then given a new clip at school so they can start earning another set of jewels.

Since there is recognition for good behavior, all students have the chance to be positively recognized during the day. This positive attention helps all students strive to be successful. Teachers report that there are less discipline problems in the classroom. This system has been so successful it is being used on the bus and will soon be used in the cafeteria.


Reading + Nonfiction + iPads = Fun

Educators + Technology + 21st Century Skills = Fletcher School

It's flexible, creative, challenging, complex and reflective of a rapidly changing world. It's 21st century technology skills and Fletcher's teachers and students are embracing it.

One of the most fascinating links on the library webpage includes a website on ratio and proportions that shows a human being in proportion to other items such as a basketball or an elephant and allows the user to "zoom in" to atomic levels or "zoom out" to astronomical levels so the students really get a good feel for proportion.

Fletcher school has recently become the home for 24 iPads. The students use the iPads to support their learning in their coursework. In Mrs. Melissa Schmidt's class, they have downloaded educational apps such as the Rock Cycle app which is an interactive story about the life of a rock. Weathered and aged, he tells his life story in the form of a poem. Each stanza is supplemented with interactive images, diagrams, and mini-games.

Students have also used the Journey through the Solar System app which includes a few comments and facts about each planet, along with a close-up image of the

planets. There is also an animated orbit for the planets. Students have also used a NASA app to learn about the planets and the sun as well.

In addition, Mrs. Schmidt reports that her students have also used the iPads to learn about the Periodic Table of Elements. Students swiped and touched each element to learn the element's name, symbol, atomic



number and atomic mass. They even learned how elements combine to make everyday objects such as a cup of coffee. Recently they were able to build an element, adding in the correct number of protons, neutrons and electrons. The students really enjoyed seeing the electrons darting around the atoms, and teachers really enjoyed seeing smiling students who love learning so much!
